

CANOEING COURSE

A new activity planned by the Country Education Project will involve the setting up of a canoeing program in the Loddon-Campaspe region for both adults and students. By providing the necessary equipment and instructors, the CEP hopes to give people of all ages an introduction into an exciting, rapidly growing sport which caters for all interest groups; from the thrill-seekers "shooting the rapids" to those more content with a sedate paddle around a quiet lake.

The program intends to start with the basics of canoeing, leading up to how to become more involved in the sport, on either an individual or group level. An important part of the course will be the teaching of the safety aspects, such as when and where to paddle, what to avoid whilst in the water and what to do in the event of such problems as a capsiz. These safety aspects will be covered both in theory, and practice, with participants taking part in capsiz drills involving righting an upside down boat in deep water with the help of another canoe.

Also covered in the course will be the skills involved in manoeuvring a canadian canoe or kayak and how to repair any damage by fibreglassing. For those who wish to go further in the sport, the type of equipment involved and what to buy will be covered. For example, what sort of canoe is best for the sort of paddling to be done, what other equipment such as life jackets, helmets and spray decks will be needed. In all the course will cater for people with varying degrees of interest in the sport; from those who only wish to experience a different sport to those planning to become involved more heavily in it.

Hopefully the course will be ready to go by the warmer weather in September, when it will be made available to schools in the area.

Courses for adults will be run in each area either concurrently with school use or as the need occurs. Adult courses will be arranged for convenient times, probably at weekends. With a big demand for the sport in the area, it is hoped the course is successful, as this could lead to it expanding and taking on a much larger scale.

Paradiddle

The students at Pyramid Hill H.S., and St. Pat's are in for a fair dinkum, you beaut musical experience. True blue Aussie music playing bush/folk band Paradiddle will be appearing at Pyramid on the afternoon of Tuesday 8th June.

This Melbourne folk band is comprised of six music teachers and professional musicians.

A selection of well and lesser known Australian bush songs is presented, along with lively jigs and tunes from Australia and the British Isles.

A large range of instruments is demonstrated, including mandolin, dulcimer, spoons, bodhran, (goat skin drum), penny whistles, bagpipes, accordian and lagerphone.

The band members have all had experience working with children in their capacities as teachers and musicians, which is very evident in their ability to establish immediate rapport with their young audience.

Paradiddle offer you a vibrant programme of colonial dancing, in which they demonstrate and teach the children to participate in a number of colonial dances.

The dances taught include the Circassian Circle, Galopede and Brown Jug Polka. Each dance is dealt with section by section, the steps being individually demonstrated and learnt and finally put together to the accompaniment of music from the band.

Cost to students will be \$1.20, an extremely reasonable price, when you consider that this is a chance for students to learn something of our country's heritage and culture.

The C.E.P. is partially funding this worthwhile event and the cost is to cover the rest of the bands fees.

And parents who are interested in this vital music that has thrilled generations of Australians need not despair as moves are underway to ensure that one way or another there will be a night time performance (and dinner dance?). Keep reading the Press, cobbers and mates, cos a ripper, bonza real beaut bush band like Paradiddle is too good to miss.



May Council Meeting outcomes

Quarterly reports for Local Laws and Planning

Compliance and Road Management Plan Defect Rectification Compliance were received and noted by Council at its May Council meeting.

As outlined in the Road Management Plan (RMP) Defect Rectification Compliance report, Council's road network is continuing to be assessed for flood damage with two roads still closed.

In accordance with Council's RMP, on 18 October 2022 the Plan was suspended under the exceptional circumstances clause as it was taking longer than usual for issues to be fixed on Council's road network due to the flood damage.

Routine maintenance inspections, previously on hold so staff could gather information for flood damage repair funding, have now resumed.

The extent of the impact on Council's ability to return to normal levels of road maintenance is still being assessed. In the meantime Council will maintain the network as safe as reasonably possible given the circumstances.

At the meeting, Council also:

- Approved the Audit and Risk Committee Charter 2023-2025.
- Authorised the Chief Executive Officer to enter into a new Service and Funding Agreement with the Goldfields Library Corporation.
- Received and noted three Audit and Risk Committee documents being the Annual Performance Assessment (Survey) Report 2022-2023, Biannual Report – May 2023, and 1 May 2023 meeting Minutes.

Council considered one confidential report, the sale of a number of properties for rate recovery under section 181 of the Local Government Act 1989.
