Kelly Park Update

Residents will notice a change in faces and activity levels at Kelly Park over the coming weeks. Loddon Shire CEO attended the Pyramid Hill Progress Association Meeting last week to confirm that new contractors have started work on the final stages of the park, and we hope that means a speedy completion of this long project. A media release from Council yesterday, states:

The Council and the contractor for the Pyramid Hill Streetscape Project have reached a mutual agreement for the contractor to exit the project site.

The Council will now take on the responsibility of completing the remaining works through direct management and coordination of individual contractors.

This decision was made with a primary focus on achieving the best possible outcome for the community of Pyramid Hill and need to complete the outstanding works in a timely manner.

The Council remains committed to delivering a high-quality streetscape that enhances the local area, promotes community wellbeing, and meets the needs and expectations of residents.

Taking over the completion of the works will allow the Council to maintain control over the project's timeline and budget, ensuring that any disruptions are minimised and that the project aligns closely with the community's vision for the area.

WATER NEWS FROM GMW

Plan water needs before irrigation season ends

Irrigators are encouraged to begin making preparations to ensure their water needs are met for the irrigation off-season.

The 2023/24 irrigation season ends on 15 May 2024, with water deliveries ceasing until the new season begins on 15 August 2024.

Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) Water Delivery Services general manager Warren Blyth said it was crucial irrigators planned for the off-season.

“Works such as weed treatment, desilting, and refurbishing channel banks are essential to the performance of our delivery system, however, these works can only be effectively completed when channels are dewatered,” he said.

“Channels can be lowered at any time during the three-month off-season. Irrigators who still need water during this period should make alternate arrangements to secure water, such as filling their tanks and dams.”

The last day to submit water orders to ensure delivery is Friday 10 May 2024. “Most irrigators are familiar with the dates for the start and end of the irrigation season, but we often need to dewater different parts of our channel network from year to year,” Mr Blyth said.

“It is therefore important irrigators do not assume they will have access to water for domestic and stock or irrigation purposes simply because that has been the case in previous irrigation off-seasons.”

Customers are also advised to be aware of any blue-green algae alerts in their area, particularly if they are planning to fill on-farm channels. People can see where blue-green algae warnings are in place by visiting the GMW website: www.gmwater.com.au/bga

The 2024/25 irrigation season will begin on Thursday 15 August 2024, with customers able to place their first orders from Monday 12 August 2024.

Consider carryover options for unused water

Irrigators are being encouraged to think about how they manage their water entitlements as the 2023/24 irrigation season enters its final weeks.

Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) customers have several different options for how they manage their unused water ahead of the end of the irrigation season on Wednesday 15 May. This includes the option to “carry over” water, allowing customers to keep some or all of their unused allocations for the next irrigation season.

GMW Water Delivery Services general manager Warren Blyth said it is important customers are aware of their options. “Customers in the Broken, Bullarook, Campaspe, Goulburn, Loddon and Murray systems all have the opportunity to carry over, but the rules between these systems vary,” he said.

“Unused allocation will automatically carry over for customers as long as it is held in an allocation account (ABA) linked to their water shares before 28 June 2024.”

Customers who choose not to carry over unused water entitlements can instead look to sell unused water by finding a buyer or using a broker to find one. Online trades must be submitted by 5pm, 28 June 2024.

The Victorian Water Register’s carryover calculator is a helpful tool to understand how carryover

rules work in northern Victoria and explore how carryover, spills and allocations affect the amount of water available under customers’ entitlements in different scenarios. The calculator can be found on the Victorian Water Register website: <https://www.waterregister.vic.gov.au/>

Water entitlement holders on the Campaspe, Goulburn and Murray systems can also opt to relinquish water that they do not wish to carryover. Further details on relinquishing water are available on the GMW website: www.gmwater.com.au/relinquishing-allocation

Pyramid Hill Football Notes

The first game for the season at Mitchell Park saw the Bulldogs bounce back well in both Seniors and Reserves after defeats at 'Serp in the season opener; both teams scored healthy victories. CHEST PAIN

Chest pain can be an indicator of a potentially life threatening problem and needs to be treated as a medical emergency.

**“Chest Pain” can be separated into two categories;
Angina or a Heart Attack.**

Angina is a partial blockage of the arteries in the heart caused by a build-up of fatty deposits within the arteries.

A heart attack occurs when there is a complete blockage of these arteries starving the heart muscle of oxygen.

Heart Attack Risk Factors

- Unhealthy eating
- Being overweight
- Being physically inactive
- Smoking
- High blood pressure and/or cholesterol
- Family history of heart attacks
- Diabetes

Chest Pain can start suddenly or over a few minutes. It can be described as tightness, heaviness, an ache or squeezing and can be severe, mild or moderate.

Chest Pain may spread from;

- Discomfort in the neck, an ache or tightness in/around the jaw
- An ache, heaviness or pressure around one or both shoulders/arms
- Pain, heaviness, tightness or crushing sensation in the centre of the chest

However not all patients experience chest discomfort and can present with;

- Shortness of breath
- Nausea or vomiting
- Feeling faint or dizzy
- Sweaty and pale skin

WHEN TO CALL 000 IMMEDIATELY

- If the patient had been prescribed medication such as a tablet or mouth spray to treat episodes of chest pain, help them to take this as directed.
- If symptoms get worse or persist after 10 minutes call 000
- If the patient has no allergy to, or has not been advised against taking Aspirin, give 3 aspirin tablets
- Wait on the line with 000 for further instructions
- If the patient becomes unconscious follow DRSABCD
