

PYRAMID PRESS

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Last Friday, a crowd of around 40 people supported Jean Mann's walk to recognise the lives of the 33 women who have died this year alone from an act of violence. Many people expressed their regret of not being able to join the walk but were deeply touched that the walk took place.

The crowd assembled and Jean paid homage to Hannah McGuire, a young woman who last Monday was buried in the Ballarat region. We know that Hannah worked in a school and she loved playing netball. Living in Pyramid Hill, we all know a young woman like Hannah.

Tribute was also paid to Samantha Murphy, a woman a year younger than Jean, who set about going on her regular exercise but was killed. It was the violent death of Samantha Murphy that deeply affected Jean as she walks daily at the Hill.

We know these women's names for the wrong reasons. Their lives were cut short by an act of violence. In a poignant moment, the crowd stood together and paid tribute to those 33 women and were determined to honour them. The crowd then headed off, united, on their walk.

On what was another perfect autumn day, the Bulldogs returned home to host Bridgewater, and in a repeat of the previous week recorded a win but suffered two defeats on the footy field. 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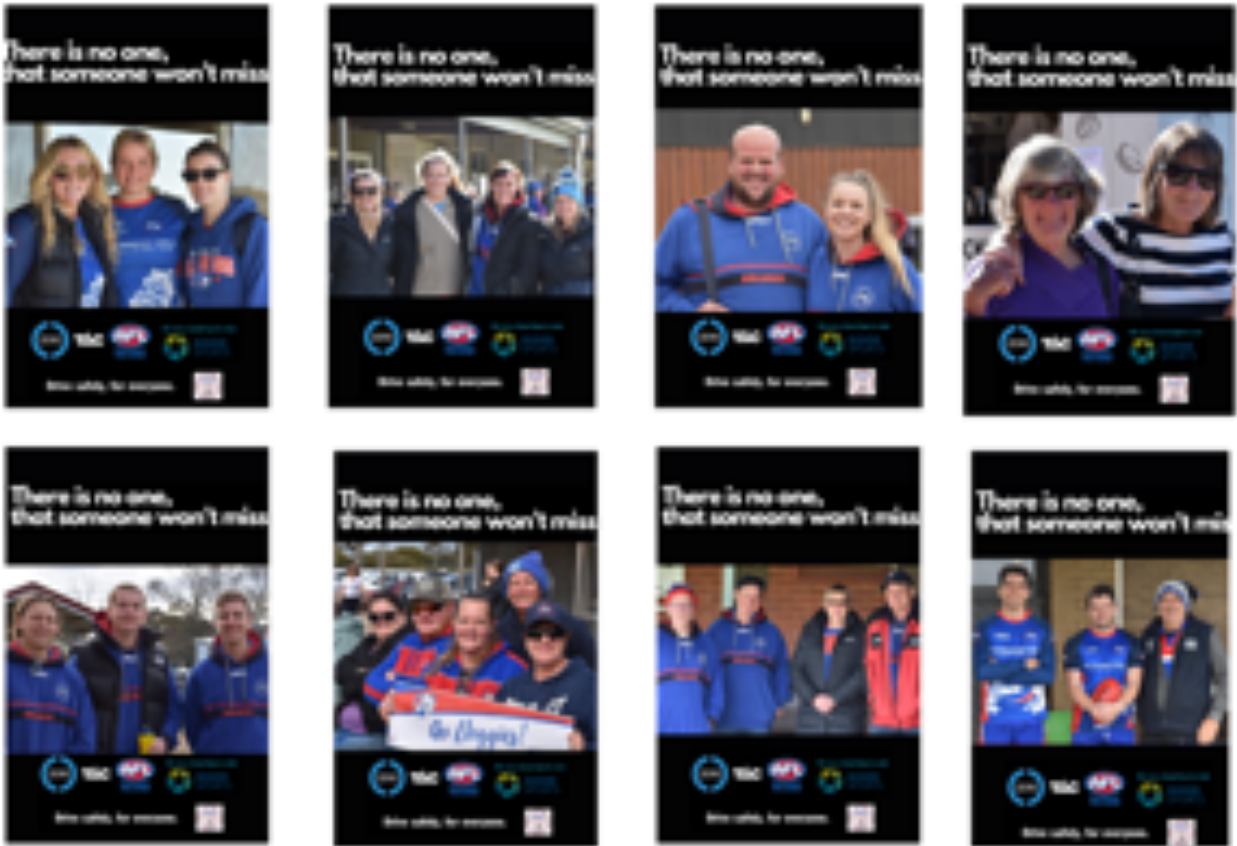

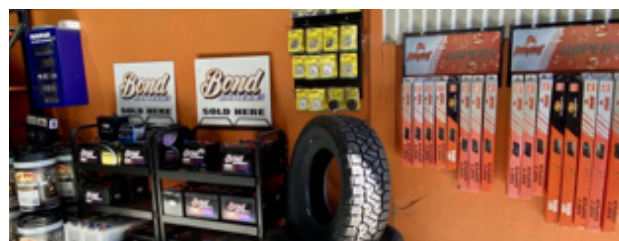

At its April Council meeting, Council resolved to advertise Loddon Shire Council's draft 2024/25 Budget (which includes the draft Fees and Charges Schedule) is now out for public comment until Monday 27 May 2024.

Feedback should be referenced with 'Draft Financial Documents Feedback' and can state whether they wish to provide their feedback in person at the June Council Forum.

Copies are also available for inspection at Council's Wedderburn office during business hours or can be posted out on request by calling Council's Customer Service on (03) 5494 1200.

Council will meet to consider any feedback at the Council Forum on Tuesday 11 June 2024. Council will then consider adoption of the Draft Budget at the Ordinary Meeting of Council on Tuesday 25 June 2024. Council will give public notice of its decision.

Autumn Firewood Collection

Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFM) has opened the Autumn firewood collection season until Sunday 30 June 2024. This means that woodcutting for personal use has been permitted in designated areas of the forest. You can access the guidelines by clicking on the link <https://www.vic.gov.au/collecting-firewood>. To find a firewood collection area please visit <https://www.ffm.vic.gov.au/firewood/find-a-firewood-collection-area>

Remember :

- You can only collect trees or parts of trees that are already on the ground.
- Don't collect trees that are clearly hollow or more than half the tree is covered in moss or fungi.
- Don't take wood within 20m of any rivers, creeks, lakes or dams.
- Take litter with you when you leave.
- It is illegal to sell firewood you collect from collection areas.
- There is no guarantee that firewood will be available for collection in the firewood collection area.
