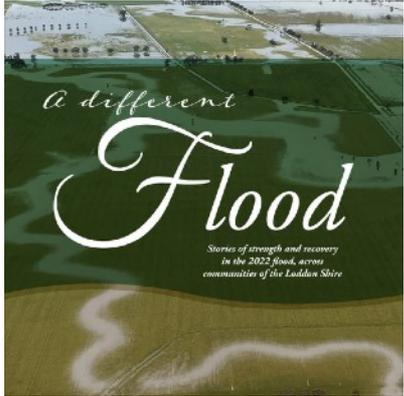

Bowls Notes:

Hold onto your seats folks, this is a story with a dramatic climax!

Division 2 Weekend Pennant are into the Grand Final!

Now I know for some that might mean “no big deal”, but for PHBC there has been a long-time drought since the last time that occurred, so for those who played and achieved this feat, it is “a big deal”. So here’s how it all infolded....

Setting the scene: after defeating Barham giants the previous week, the Preliminary Final match against Wakool was scheduled for play at Cohuna Golf. The temperature was hot, very hot and steamy, but thankfully no wind. The greens were fast, but deceptively fast, as usually with a fast green the taking of plenty of grass allowing the bowls plenty of room for bias draw is the norm.

However, that was not the case on this day. It was a challenge to find the right weight and width, a battle that lasted all day as the greens got even faster as the heat set in. Regardless, it is the same conditions for everyone so the challenge was to try to adapt and adjust and take down another giant.

Nerves were on edge as we played our first ends. Wakool had won the right to play first and took advantage of that by rolling short ends; they figured that we might struggle by employing that tactic.

And they were probably right. Each of our rinks lost their first end. Was that to be an omen????!!

Lionel, with his crew of Carmen, Glen and Joe, plugged away scoring only single shots when they won an end while their opponents compiled a score gaining increments by 2s or 3s each time. By the lunch time break, despite winning 7 of the 12 ends played, the PH team were down 7 shots to 12. It was looking a bit grim but they came out fighting and picked up 3 shots on their first end after the refreshments which put them right back in contention.

Then the real fight began. Lionel hit his straps and was bowling at his brilliant best – the game of his life. Wakool steadied and won 4 on the next two ends but Lionel and crew began whittling away their deficit winning 6 of the last 9 ends, importantly winning the last 3 ends to finish only 2 shots in arrears. Lionel was well supported by Joe, Glen and his trusty Third, Carmen, but he was stunning the crowd with his precision bowling squeezing through the smallest of gaps to get shot. It was a great fight back and placed the Club in a good position- if they could only get enough shots on the other rinks to cover.

Jan playing Skip to Jean, Kate and Rose, lost their two first ends but then found good rhythm and were in the

zone accumulating a handy lead of 7 shots at the break – 13-6. However, they got the wrong sandwich mix and lost their momentum going down 3 shots straight after lunch. They handed off another 4 shots shortly after and all of a sudden it seemed the wheels had fallen off and Wakool had bridged the gap to reduce the PH lead to just 1 shot. Jan rallied her troops and they briefly picked up and nosed ahead but stumbled again to be all loaded at 17 apiece on their last end. (We’ll come back to that.)

With Marie S’s match already complete the game was in the balance. They finished 3 shots up and had covered the two shot shortfall on Lionel’s rink but there was no accounting for what might happen next. During their twenty-one ends, Marie S., Marie N., Terry and Ian, combined to amass a score of 5 shots on the 10th end and 6 shots on the 14th end.

With those tallies one could be entitled to think that they had a comfortable lead, but NO. By the 13th end Wakool had won enough ends, getting 2 shots each time, to tie the game up (13 all on the 13th end). Then came the 6 shot haul by PH which put them in good stead until they gifted 5 shots back to their opponents on the 18th end allowing them a sniff at victory. Single scores were attained for the last 3 ends with PH winning two of those.

Their game finished with PH ahead on the scoreboard, 24-21. A hard fought win at that, with everyone doing something at some time. A win on one rink at least, but was it enough?!!

Now back to the last rink to finish. Let’s build the crescendo! PH are in front overall by 1 shot. The outcome of the match all comes down to the playing of the last end on Jan’s rink. Sixteen bowls to be played!

The nerves were jingling (even as they are as this report is written). One shot, just one shot in our favour was all we needed. One shot in Wakool’s favour would have caused a draw and the playing of an extra end. The knees weakened at the thought of it!

Rose and Kate played their two bowls each and, although handy, were beaten by the Wakool bowlers. So here we are – Wakool holding 3 shots, a wall of protective bowls in front of Jack, Jean on the mat feeling virtually sick to the stomach and needing to pull something out of the hat. You could cut the air with a knife and we all held our collective breaths.

With nerves of steel and great resolve, Jean’s first bowl was a corker. She could not have played it any better. Brilliantly, amazingly, unbelievably, a touch on the Jack shot it out to the side where PH had waiting catching bowls – thanks, Rose and Kate.

What happened next is a bit of a blur. We can’t recall what happened with Jean’s second bowl, nor her opponent’s bowls. They were somewhere in the mix. We were too busy crossing fingers, toes and eyes and

chanting silent prayers. The opposing Skip played his first bowl - short. Jan played a great bowl to be in the count and seal the deal. The last bowl from the opposition Skip also pulled up short, so with a count of two shots up (maybe 3 if a measure was taken), Jan had no need to play her last bowl.

Game over, match won, Grand Final here we come!!! 59-56 phew, and phew again! Whatever happens next week in the contest against Cohuna Golf, we are stoked with what we have achieved and will be sure to give it a red hot crack.

Honestly though, we could not have pulled that win off without the support of our two emergencies, Lyn and David and our avid spectators. Lyn and David sacrificed their own comfort as they kept themselves busy refilling water bottles and drink cups, wetting neck towels and sharing watermelon slices to keep the players hydrated and cooled. It also allowed players to remain at their rink head and keep focussed rather than having to trek to the 20+ metre distant water tap all the time. Thanks, David and Lyn, you kept us in the game. You were invaluable in your contribution.

We also appreciated the spectators who offered support and encouragement. There were probably many times when you were pulling your hair out and thinking why aren't they getting closer to the jack, but the greens were fair dinkum trying us. We know you had our backs - quite often I wished you had my bowl! Thanks for cheering us on.

Well, if that doesn't get you off your lounge chairs, I don't know what does! Apparently, as news of our win filtered through the town on Saturday night, the place went into shock and the whole town blacked out. That could be only explanation for the power outage, surely!

Other news - Yes, there is other news!

Barefoot Bowls: Last Wednesday night, with near perfect conditions, 42 locals engaged in some fun on the greens. The competition was fierce, nearly as fierce as competition in the Winter Olympic, though there was no injecting with hyaluronic acid that could be detected, at least. After consuming the bbq and topping up their tanks with fuel from the bar, the bowlers participated in two games using the 100 up scoring system. 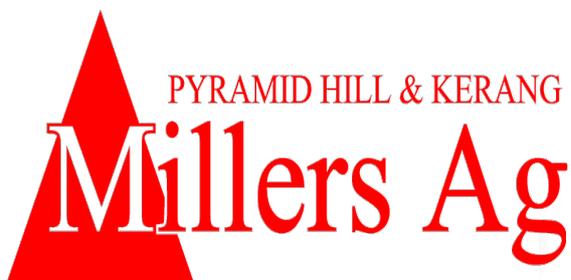

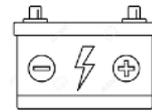

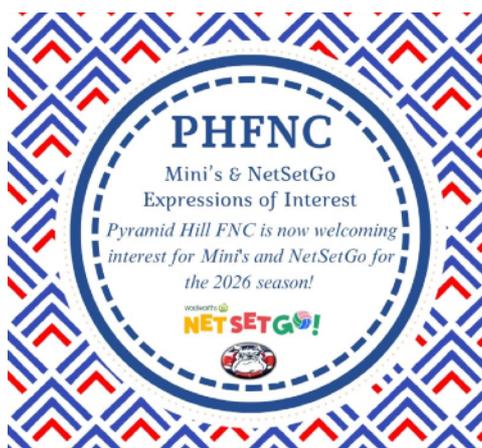
