Our guest speaker will be Georgia Anderson from Northern District Health.

Georgia facilitates the *Support for Carers Program*. This program is Victorian funded but still relates very close to Carer Gateway supports.

A carer is someone who cares or supports someone at home, or in the community, with daily living tasks, drives them to appointments or always filling a 'gap'. They may care for someone with ageing needs, health conditions, disabilities, or mental illness. Carers' can be of any age and can care for more than one person.

The criteria is very simple and most of the time carers don't realise they are eligible for support.

Some supports through the program include: - Extra in-home supports like personal care or house cleaning. - Gardening support. - Group supports and social activities. - Fuel and transport assistance. The main aim is RESPITE, and it comes in many forms. Even massage therapy, beauty therapy, accommodation to have time away, etc. It all comes down to what the carer is needing so they can continue in their role without becoming burnt out.

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Bowls Notes:

Still on a high from our Premiership win, we are reluctant to labour the point but it really must be done given the absence of such a feat for so many decades.

This week we celebrate the Thirds and the Skips.

The Third plays a pivotal role in a game of lawn bowls, bridging the work of previous bowlers with tactical decisions from the Skip. Their responsibilities require skill, judgement and clear communication and our Thirds, Carmen, Jean and Marie N. fulfilled these duties with commendable ability, not just in the final series but throughout the season. After the Leads and Seconds had laid the foundations of the heads, the Thirds needed to play with composure and purpose. Their bowls needed to be delivered with consistent line and thoughtful weight in order to strengthen the team's position - sometimes by drawing close to the jack, but at other times placing bowls in strategic positions to protect the shot bowls or even to pre-empt bowls still to be delivered by their opponents.



What stood out about our players was their tactical awareness and serenity. When the head required a steadying drawing bowl, it was often delivered with precision – not always of course or they would be in Team Australia. When the situation called for a more positive shot to remove an opposition bowl or change the head, the Thirds endeavoured to play with confidence and control often producing valuable results. In addition to playing their own bowls, the Thirds stand at the head when the Skip is in control and need to be



ready to read the play giving accurate, clear information to assist in bringing about a favourable outcome. Overall our Thirds performances combined skill, judgement and leadership. By supporting the Skips, strengthening the heads and managing the technical aspects of the game, our Thirds made a significant contribution to the team's effort and success. One significant moment was the turn of fortunes when, on Jan's rink Jean played with precision to flip a potential disaster into a triumph.



After accumulating nine shots on the 18th and 19th ends, and giving up two shots on the 20th end, things were looking reasonably cosy for a PH victory, but anything can happen in a game of bowls. It was of paramount importance that that rink of ladies who had combined so well on the day hold firm to the end. So cometh the last end and they are six shots down in the head when the call of desperation signaled something had to be produced. On the long end, Jean's first bowl was played a tad anxiously and had too much weight, but her second bowl, delivered with weight of responsibility and a fair bit of trepidation, landed jack high and claimed shot. The conclusion to that magical turn of events is in the tribute to the Skips where it is told of how Jan applied the finishing touches. A fantastic result by our Thirds – steady and true.

So here's a tribute in the form of an Ode to the **Thirds, Carmen, Jean and the other one:**

*O Third who walks with thoughtful tread,
Where other bowls already lie spread,
Between the head and Skip you stand,
With steady mind and guiding hand.
You read the head with practiced eye
Where hopes and dangers close may lie;
A gentle draw, a weighted shot,
To guard the place or claim the spot.
When bowls lie tangled round the jack,
You judge the line, the angle's track.
With quiet skill and measured grace
You turn the fortunes of the place.
And when the measure must be made
Your eagle eye will not be swayed.
With trusty tape the truth you find
And leave no doubt and guess behind,
So praise the Third whose thoughtful art
Brings hope and joy to Skip's bold heart;
For in the balance of the game
The Third upholds the team's acclaim.*

The Skip: The Skip is the one at the helm, predominantly hoping for bowls in the head to work with. The Pyramid Hill Skips, Lionel, Jan and Marie S. held the key leadership roles, responsible not only for delivering the final bowls of each end but also for guiding the team's overall strategy. In our finals match our Skips played with confidence, composure and sound judgement. It is often thought that the Skip has to fix everything, but that is not their role – although it does help. Throughout the match our Skips were busy reading their respective clusters of bowls in the head on each end and setting clear tactical objectives for the team to apply pressure on the opposition.

When it was their turn to step onto the mat, they needed to draw on their own resolve and skill to either improve the team's position or get shot themselves. At times they had to execute bowls demanding a weighted line and length to remove opposition bowls and clear the head, and even on the odd occasion play a short blocking bowl to hinder or obstruct the path of their opponents. The Skips have to work in tandem with their Thirds, considering options carefully and choosing the shots that best served the team's chances. Their talent is a joy to behold. Each one, Lionel, Jan and Marie S. achieved their aim. Jan was on fire all day, right from her very first bowl she set the scene for her crew, drawing shot first end and weaving her skills throughout the match.

On that vital last end, to secure a good Club victory, when the other two rinks had not been able to subdue their opponents, and they were six shots down in the head, it was Jan who firstly directed Jean's play for the jack high bowl before providentially adding to the count with a solid bowl herself. That proved to be a nine shot turn around – six down to three up. (The opposing Skip was unfortunate to knock Kate's bowl into our count). Lionel, always a calming influence, toiled steadily to keep his team in the running. His precision bowling on crucial shots frequently drew applause from the onlookers and players alike as they eroded away the deficit score to so very nearly gain victory. They were unfortunate to be thwarted by their opposing Skip on the last end when, holding five shots her great bowl reduced their tally to one. Marie's strong leadership, tactical awareness and calm presence were equally important as she guided her rink to keep in touch. Although going down on the day it was her rink who had been highly successful throughout the season. Ultimately, the encouragement and support of the Skips for their team players helped maintain focus and confidence throughout the match and each of them played a central role in the winning Premiership performance. What a crew with amazing talent!

So here's a few lines dedicated to our fantastic Skips: **Lionel, Jan and Marie S.**

*O Skip of steady hand and watchful eye
You stand where final fortunes lie;
While others build the early frame,
You guide the course and shape the game.
You read the head upon the green
Where hope and hazard both are seen;
With quiet word and thoughtful sign
You set the path, the weight, the line.
When pressure gathers on the mat
And bowls lie close where jack is sat
You send your bowl with measured pace
To claim the shot or change the place.
A gentle nod, a measured call
Encouraging the team through it all;
For more than bowls your role must be-
You lead with calm authority.
So here's to you at day's last light
When ends are won by skill and might,
The steady heart, the guiding grip-
All honour to the bowling Skip.*

Jan, so on song right from the get go, Lionel who starred so brilliantly in the dying stages, and Marie S.

who was so steady throughout – take a bow, because we applaud you.

Congratulations again and again to all bowlers – what a tremendous performance to soar from fourth to first. May the memory of this fine win bring pride and satisfaction and may the joy remain in your hearts and minds for many days. It should surely reinforce that we are capable and give us credence to anticipate further victories in days to come.

Duck hunters encouraged to plan ahead

With duck hunting season approaching, people are being encouraged to familiarise themselves with the rules for hunting at Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) lakes, dams and reservoirs.

The Victorian Government has announced the 2026 duck hunting season will run from 18 March to 8 June.

Duck hunting is permitted at the following GMW storages: Cairn Curran Reservoir, Hume Reservoir (Victorian lakebed areas), Tullaroop Reservoir, Lake Eppalock, Laanecoorie Reservoir, Lake Eildon, Lake Buffalo, Waranga Basin, Lake Charm, Kangaroo Lake, Lake Nillahcootie, and Lake Nagambie.

Some wetlands may be closed to hunting. Hunters should regularly check the GMA website for updates on wetland management actions, including any wetlands that may be closed to hunting to protect significant concentrations of rare or threatened species, at www.gma.vic.gov.au/hunting/duck/wetland-closures-duck-season

GMW Water Storage Services general manager Jon McKeown said people visiting GMW storages during this time should be aware of where they can and can't hunt.

"Duck hunting is permitted at several of our lakes, dams and reservoirs, but there are still parts of these storages where hunting is prohibited," he said.

"It is important people learn which areas hunting is allowed in before they visit, as some of these areas have changed since previous seasons.

"Hunters will also need to get landholder consent to hunt or pass through private property that adjoins GMW land, waterways, and storages."

Duck hunters visiting GMW-managed storages must follow the arrangements laid out by the Victorian Government. This includes bag limits, what hours of the day hunting can occur, which species can be hunted and wetland management actions.

"We ask everyone who visits our storages makes safety a priority, and respects both the environment and other members of the public," Mr McKeown said.

"If people have any questions about where they can hunt at our storages they can phone us to get clarification."

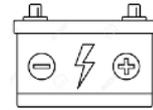
