## History of the Anzac Biccie

For more than 100 years the humble ANZAC biscuit has been a much-loved part of the Australian way of life. From sustaining our troops in World War One to filling today's school lunchboxes, the simple oat recipe has been loved by generations. While the biscuit itself is a reasonably basic blend of oats, flour and syrup, the history of the Anzac biscuit is far richer.

The humble biscuit came to the fore in Australia when tins of the morsels were sent in care packages to troops on the frontlines of World War One by wives, mothers and girlfriends concerned about the food being supplied to "the boys".

Known then as Soldiers or Army biscuits, they were nutritious but most importantly long-lasting and still edible after the many months at sea travelling to the various theatres of war. After the landing at Gallipoli that they became known as ANZAC biscuits.

The recipe we have included in this edition of the Press is from the RSL Website, and is largely seen as the most traditional version of the recipe.

*[I've double checked with Kate Wood, and made a couple of minor tweaks on her recommendation]*

Do you like your Anzac's chewy or crunchy; flat or with a little bit of body? Do you shape them while they're still hot to make the extra round?



**Tip!** A black baking tray will absorb heat, so use a silver baking tray if you don't want your biscuits to be dark (or worse burn) on the bottom.



### Ingredients

- 1 cup plain flour
- 1 cup rolled oats
- 3/4 cup desiccated coconut
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 125g butter
- 2 tbsp golden syrup
- 2 tbsp hot water
- 1 tsp bicarb soda

### Method

1. Preheat the oven to 175 degrees Celsius\*.
2. Combine the flour, oats, coconut and sugar in a large bowl. In a saucepan, melt the butter and then add the golden syrup. Bring it to the boil before removing it from the stove.
3. Mix the hot water and bicarb soda and add it to the butter and syrup – it should froth up. Pour this into the dry ingredients and stir together. If the mixture is a little dry, add some water.
4. Take spoonfuls of the mixture, roll them into balls and place them on a greased baking tray, about 5cm apart. Use a fork to flatten them and then put them in the oven for 15 minutes\* or until they're golden brown.
5. Once they're removed from the oven, let the biscuits cool on the baking tray for about a minute, and then move them to a wire rack to cool completely.

## Anzac Day Mystery - solved!

Late last year Neighbourhood House was approached by Alan Mann to do some detective work regarding the soldier referenced in an unsigned letter, that had come into Alan's possession.

### Private Philip King Smith. 5196

From our investigations we found the reason the Education Department Inspector was attending Durham Ox School was to inform Mr Smith that he was in line for a promotion!

On Philip's return from service in 2019, he found out his father - a local entrepreneur - and owner of property Argyle Park - the Durham Ox Inn, had died just a few months before, at age 75.

### Letter - March 4 1916

*On Friday, 18 February I visited the Durham Ox School for intended inspection. I found the school closed. The school-room and surroundings were in a neglected condition.*

*I knew nothing of the closing of the school or the absence of the teacher. After inspection of the grounds, and having seen the interior of the school-room from the windows, I left the school. Just after I had begun my return journey, I was hailed on the road by a man who had seen me at the school, and who said he was a member of the School Committee. He informed me that the teacher had enlisted. I referred to the neglected condition of the school surroundings, and said I could not understand a teacher leaving the place in such a state. I also said that I should have been notified of the closing of the school. He said that the School Committee had not been notified either. The only other school matters I spoke of were the probability of an early reopening of the school and the accommodation for a teacher.*

*I did not discuss Mr Smith's enlistment, or make any statement concerning Mr Smith's motives for enlistment. The man I met was a stranger to me. I do not know his name. My conversation with him lasted only a few minutes. I spoke to no other person in the district. I did not speak of Mr. Smith's enlistment to any other person.*

*I did not impute covert motives to Mr Smith's enlistment; I did not state that he wished to evade degradation or dismissal.*

*I disclaim any such thoughts concerning Mr Smith's enlistment.*

*I have no doubt whatever but that he enlisted for purely patriotic motives, and I should be pleased to congratulate him on his action when the opportunity offered.*

**Studio portrait of 5196 Private (Pte) Phillip King Smith, 6th Battalion, holding what appears to be a sugar glider marsupial. A school teacher from Durham Ox, Victoria prior to enlistment,**

*Pte Smith embarked with the 16th Reinforcements from Melbourne on HMAT Suffolk on 1 April 1916. Later transferring to the 57th Battalion he was wounded in action and evacuated to England. Following his recovery he joined the 60th Battalion and was wounded in action for the second occasion. Once again evacuated to England, he was still recovering when the Armistice was declared and returned to Australia on 9 February 1919.*

*This is one of a series of photographs taken by the Darge Photographic Company which had a concession to take photographs at the Broadmeadows and Seymour army camps during the First World War. In the 1930s, the Australian War Memorial purchased the original glass negatives from Algernon Darge, along with the photographers' notebooks. The notebooks contain brief details, usually a surname or unit name, for each negative.*

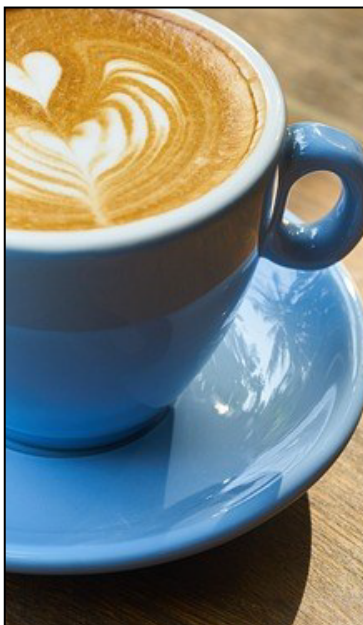

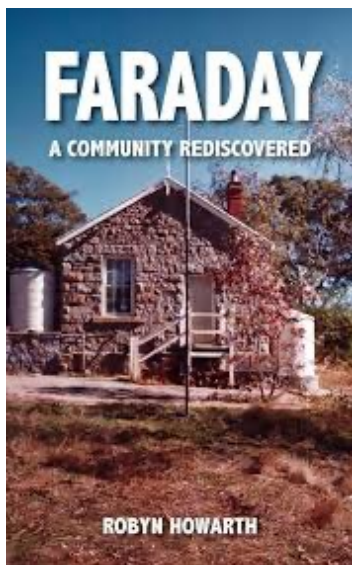
### Hi Neighbours!

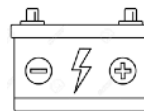
